
In-person services and in-person church activities are suspended until further notice due to COVID-19

The changes we are making in our lifestyles come almost faster than we can keep up with. By the time you read this we will worshipped only by livestream worship rather than in-person for 3 weeks. And as I write this, I have no way to tell if that practice will continue for a bit or not.

Calling and pastoral care contacts by me as pastor and by the deacons will have been by phone, e-mail or other social media. We want to keep safe practices of social distancing. In person meetings, choir practice, Sunday school, second hours have all been halted.

As one person has said to me "Honestly, I hadn't planned on giving up quite this much for Lent."

I imagine all the closures and cancellations give people a sense of an ominous future. But what we're doing is really an act of sacrificial love for our communities:


- We're sacrificing so we can give doctors, nurses and hospitals a fighting chance as numbers of patients increase.
- We're sacrificing so we can protect friends and family.
- We're sacrificing as a way to protect the more vulnerable members of our communities.
- We're sacrificing as a way to follow Jesus' words to "Love our neighbors."
- We're sacrificing as a way to "Love ourselves" while loving neighbors.

Lent is a good time to reflect on sacrificial love. The heart of our faith centers sacrificial love of Jesus Christ that was so clearly seen on Good Friday and was so victorious on our behalf on Easter. That love shapes our lives as followers whether we term it sacrificial love or servant love or self-giving love. In this case, we are not just practicing healthy actions. We are practicing sacrificial love as modeled by Jesus.

That love also leads us to new life on Easter. I don't know all the ways we will see new life but I already can see that we will see greater control of COVID19. We will see greater appreciation of activities we may have been taking for granted. We will see new methods and attention for helping those with greater economic challenges. We will have found new ways to stay in touch that can continue. We will have found new skills in broadcasting our service which will allow new ways to reach people and new ways for shut-ins, the ill, those on vacations to connect in worship.

And if we keep our hearts and spirits open, we will look back and see how God has been with us, we will look around and see how God is with us. We will look to the future and see that God is already ahead of us to guide and encourage us as we go forward.



A Message from Belinda Quaye Director of Christian Education



We Encourage Donations to Support Current West African Ministries

Westminster has been blessed by its involvement with African Christians. At a time when the world is dealing with a pandemic, our partners in Ghana, Liberia, and Sierra Leone have sent recent messages to tell us they are praying for us. And, we are praying for them.

A blog, "Your Gifts Make These West African Ministries Possible" (to read visit: wpcalbany.org/blog) demonstrates that Westminster is funding projects that transform the lives of children and families in West Africa. In 2019, Westminster raised more than \$33,890 from individual donors and grants in addition to an additional \$7,400 from the Church. As of the end of March, Westminster had raised \$8,860 to supplement the annual grant from the Church.

While the March 21 African Spring Dinner was cancelled, the Church's work continues in West Africa. We encourage you to continue your support for the work which we hope to celebrate at a November 7 dinner, if the restrictions due to the COVID-19 pandemic are lifted.

In 2020, Westminster hopes to explore ways of working closely with its Tema partners to keep girls in school through an expanded menstrual hygiene education program.




Girls in rural Ghana receive menstrual supplies from a Tema partner.

African Mission Partner Highlights

• Working with a Tema partner to increase food security for villagers

In 2016, one of our Tema partners -- HOCAP (Home of Care and Projection) -- initiated a relationship with Nyitawuta, an isolated rural village in the Volta region of Ghana. Farms in this community provide food for residents and are the most important source of outside income. One of the recent major goals for the HOCAP partnership with Nyitawuta has been to help the farmers increase the quality and quantity of crop yield.

In 2019 and 2020, Westminster contributed a \$2,000 grant to permit the start of a demonstration farm and also sent \$1,000 to help start the construction of large dam to irrigate 200 farms in the community. The irrigation well project was completed in February 2020 before the start of the rainy season at a total cost of \$17,000. Villagers cleared the land, and HOCAP organized the funding and construction of the well using the GlobalGiving web site, their own reserves, and the contribution from Westminster.



Working together to multiply resources to help girls

Two of Westminster's Tema partners -- HOCAP and Tema Redemption Church -- joined together in 2019 to request money for menstrual hygiene education programs in rural communities: \$1,500 for Nyitawuta and \$700 for Okushibri. The partners were so impressed by the results of these programs that they replicated the training for a public school adopted last year by Redemption Church and raised about \$2,650 to give 13 teenage mothers an occupation. Most had been raped or forced into marriage. The Nyitawuta girls learned how to sew in a six-month program and later each received a sewing machine. In 2020, HOCAP will continue the vocational training program and the partners will run a Phase 2 menstrual hygiene training program.

Barbara Asempa, HOCAP Executive Director and Catechist of Tema Redemption Church, said, Westminster "brought these activities into reality by starting the menstrual hygiene education program." She added, "Our partnership with WPC is bringing joy and hope to the poor and the underprivileged."





• Hope Mission School Organizes and Funds School's New Agricultural Project (report from Felicia Kollie-Gambles)

Westminster has had a partnership with the Hope Mission School in Bernard Farm, Liberia since 2007 when Hope Mission was educating a few children in the pastor's home. Today, Hope Mission runs a K-12 school with more than 300 students and has had two high school graduating classes. In 2017 Westminster obtained a \$18,300 thank-offering grant from Presbyterian Women, designed to build the school's capacity. The agricultural project, started in 2019, is one of the first projects designed, funded, and run solely by Hope Mission.

Hope Mission's agriculture program at Hope mission is progressing. The kids are very involved with the project. They have planted potato greens, bitter balls, peppers, cucumbers, cassava, etc. The crops help the administrators give the teachers crops as bonuses and add to the feeding of the 11 Ebola orphans supported by Westminster. The price of foods is very high so the extra food is valued. Hope Mission administrators extend thanks and appreciation continuously to WPC for their support over the years. They also want WPC to know that if WPC had not invested in capacity building, they would have failed in operating the school and caring for the orphans. Now, they are capable of contributing to a project as there are challenges in operating schools and businesses in Liberia due to the lack of jobs. People who have jobs don't get pay monthly, but get pay every three months. Unemployment rate is still about 80 percent.

Thanks again and God bless you all. Remember our living is not in vain when we served God's children.





Westminster's October 2020 Trip to Ghana Postponed

Westminster will not be sending a delegation to Ghana this year, as had been planned, due to the COVID-19 pandemic. On March 20, the Ghana Mission Network (GMN) Steering Committee voted to postpone for one year the GMN meeting scheduled for October 2020 in Tamale, Ghana. Belinda Quaye and Gabriel Ofori-Okai both serve on the Steering Committee GMN.

Our three Tema partners were preparing to host attendees from Westminster during the week prior to the GMN meeting. Efforts will now be made to set up a one or more remote meetings using Zoom technology with our Tema partners to exchange information.

The moderator of the Presbyterian Church of Ghana has encouraged member congregations to adopt communities in impoverished parts of the country. Westminster's two Church partners are both responding. The Redemption Church is exploring the possibility of adopting a community in northern Ghana. The Greenwich Meridian Church has already started building relationships with a deprived community, Dedenyah, in a rural area of the Greater Accra Region.

The Pandemic Will Pass. Will the Climate Crisis Pass?



Remember - God's Love for Us Cannot be Cancelled


In the face of cancellations, remember: God's love for us cannot be cancelled. Prayer cannot be cancelled. Conversations need not be cancelled. Relationships need not be cancelled. Our love need not be cancelled. Our empathy and care for one another need not be cancelled. Songs can still be sung. Laughter can still be lifted. Self-care will not be cancelled. Hope will not be cancelled. Again, in Paul's words: "Hold fast to what is good." (My thanks to author Jamie Tworkwski who shared a version of my closing words.)

Easter Doesn't Require a Crowd

I think all can agree that Easter worship online just won't be the same as being in a congregation, with in-person special music and instrumentation, fuller pews, Easter lilies taunting those with allergies, and smiling faces. The lack of all these things won't stop Easter. Jesus has already left the tomb. We will miss the familiar trappings of Easter, but we still have the essentials.

In scripture, the first Easter is a fairly private affair. The small group of women come to the tomb, Peter and the disciple whom Jesus loved come to the tomb. That's about it. Later in scripture two disciples are seeking to distance themselves from Jerusalem. While on the road they see Jesus. Jesus also appears to the gathered followers, a fairly small group, as they maintain social distancing in a locked room. A bit later a few go fishing and Jesus pops up. Even by Pentecost, 50 days later, the followers of Jesus were maintaining social distancing. Only once filled with the Spirit did they surge forth into public. Then they packed the speaking venue.

So this year, let's have a scriptural Easter, rather than a packed, crowded, public Easter. Recognize the risen Lord as he comes to us in the midst of social distancing. Look for signs of hope, renewal, and new life around you. Meditate on what the promise of resurrection means for you. Feel the presence of the Spirit of our Risen Lord with you and within you. And when the time is right, and the Spirit of Wisdom and Truth speaks through health authorities, we will be swept back into gatherings of believers.




