About twenty-four years ago, I was part of a local group planning a peaceful vigil near the Capital. We needed to make final preparations for our event. Rezsin Adams encouraged us to stop by the Focus Breakfast Club, where we could gather around a table, enjoy a hot breakfast, make plans, and then walk to our public gathering. It was my first visit to the Focus Churches of Albany. I saw guests, volunteers and staff engaging each other in a warm and friendly environment. I agreed with Rezsin that this was, indeed, a special community. Little did I know that years later I would have the opportunity to be in a leadership role at Focus Churches. I am honored to serve as Executive Director for this special community.

In March, Executive Director Rev. Renee Hollinshed responded to COVID-19 by leading our transition to safely distribute food at our pantries and breakfast program. Before Rev. Renee left, she established our FOCUS Fresh Program and connected us with Soul Fire Farm. We now distribute more fresh fruit and vegetables among our pantry guests. In the spring and summer, Richard Becker served as Acting Executive Director. During this second term of his interim leadership, Richard initiated a reopening committee to safely resume indoor dining for our breakfast program. Kris Wilhelm, our resident public health expert, provided great guidance as we maneuvered through protocols to develop a safe plan.

In 2020, Lorraine Houk, our long time Pantry Coordinator, embraced new responsibilities to become our Assistant Director. Matthew Jackson and Yolandue Sturdivant joined FOCUS as Breakfast & Pantry Associates. Carlie D'Annunzio became our Bookkeeper and Tamel Anderson joined us as Breakfast Program Coordinator. Long-term staff, like Becca Leet and Karen Kendall, continued to serve our mission through the year. Betsy Gorman, our Communications Director, spreads the word. The room brightens when Belinda Quaye, our Office Manager and Volunteer Coordinator, warmly greets our volunteers.

In November, we reopened indoor dining at our Breakfast Program, safely gathering as guests, volunteers and staff. In December, we began preparing to-go hot breakfasts and lunches for a young adult job training program. During 2020, we have all experienced both unplanned joys and challenges. Instead of greeting each other with hugs and handshakes, we are keeping at least six feet from each other. Our smiles are hidden behind face masks. And yet... We are an Easter people, a community filled with hope. We believe in resurrection amid times of worry and despair. I have been able to experience this spirit of hope at FOCUS, thanks to our many guests, volunteers, supporters, board members, and staff. With your support, we continue to explore new and creative ways to meet the needs of our neighbors. We remain committed to racial justice and food security and to addressing immigration and housing issues in Albany.

Together, let us enter 2021 in faith.
